### 5 Seconds

#### What to look for in those 5 seconds

- Impact or evoke emotion
- Creative or something you haven't seen before
- Composition
- Subject Matter
- Exposure / Lighting
- Presentation

#### Some Realities of Judges/Judging

- Personal bias
- Actual or perceived skill level of them as a judge
- Actual or perceived skill level of them as a photographer
- How many times a person has judged
- Mood they are in that night
- Don't expect to get the "social media" response
- There is no silver bullet as to what every judge is looking for
- No standardization of what each score represents. It's up to each judge
- Judges can be amateur or pro photographers
- Does Judge know who photographer is
- Title of photo will sometimes make a difference
- How they are physically viewing the photo

# Things to keep in mind when reacting to Scores and Comments

- It is okay to agree or disagree with them
- Don't take it personal
- Remember they weren't there when you took the photo
- The same photo can get totally different reaction with different set of judges
- Listen to and remember reoccurring comments
- Keep open mind to other opinions
- Photography is an Art Form and everyone will see it differently

### So why submit images to be judged?

- The biggest reason is to using competitions as a learning experience.
- Often times you will find that judges see things (good and bad) in an image that you didn't.
- Don't forget to listen to scores and critique for photos that are not yours
- You should be able to track your progress as a photographer
- The more you hear certain things the more you will think about them as you are shooting and editing your photos

### How are Judges Chosen for Flagpole?

- Reach out to local clubs and ask them to provide 3 judges
- There is no vetting process
  - Although we will ask to exclude a specific judge if we had a bad experience with one
- Often times person who judges is based more on availability more than anything else
- Remember that the majority of the judges we get are amateur\hobbiest photographers just like you and me.

- Get out a piece of paper and pen/pencil
- Judge the following images from 1-5 (no 1/2's for this exercise)
  - Hold up fingers from one hand with your score
- Before we go to next image write down your score

#### Remember


- Strive to remove personal bias, such as, subject, specific technique, perceived difficulty or location knowledge
- Use the entire scoring scale to effectively differentiate photos
- Base the score on the merit of that individual photo
- Use consistent reasoning in evaluating photos

Would you have scored the previous image different if you had seen this one prior?


